Special Needs Services

Continuing to Navigate the Pandemic...



Although respite workers provided in-person services throughout the pandemic, in 2021 and 2022 many families restarted services as they felt safer having people in their home.

Respite services helped caregivers feel less isolated and more supported in taking care of their family members.

Increased outreach by staff, including additional phone check-ins, gave both respite workers and caregivers space to share their questions, worries, and hope along this journey.



The <u>Special Needs Services</u> team is proud to offer support to families who have a family member with a developmental disability. We serve parents with disabilities, children/youth with disabilities, and families with infants/young children who may have a disability. These relationship-based, people-first, trauma-informed services are primarily provided in home and community settings.

In-Home Respite Services provides one-onone care to children and adults with developmental disabilities in the client's home in order to give parents and caregivers a break from their continuous caregiving duties, reduce parental stress, prevent out of home placement, and support families to remain intact. 27,202 hours of In-Home Respite Care to 102 individuals

Respite Plus and Skills Acquisition are more intensive and structured services designed to empower clients and their families to improve their skills in the areas of communication and daily living needs by using positive behavior supports.

10,972 hours of Respite+ and Skills Acquisition to 39 individuals





94 families connected to resources through Early Start

Early Start Family Resource Center offers parent-to-parent support, information and referrals, public awareness, and family-professional collaboration for families with children ages 0-36 months who have or are at risk of having a developmental disability, giving families the building blocks needed to help their child grow.



3,689 hours of parent support services provided to 33 families Supported Parenting provides in-home, one-on-one support to families in which one of the parents has a developmental disability.

Activities include home visits, parent education, community resource linkage, and life skills education.

Continuing to Navigate the Pandemic...



During the second year of the pandemic, Supported Parenting Program staff continued to maintain their relationships with their families through increased phone contact and in person visits when possible.

This gave the staff the flexibility to be more available and accessible to families and have communication/conversations more often. Staff also had the opportunity to help families navigate the transition of their children returning to in-person learning.

Moving forward, staff are encouraging more in-person meetings, while also maintaining the increased availability by phone to continue supporting families with rebuilding connections, structure and routines that were disrupted by the pandemic.

Family Empowerment Services

As the world remained virtual, Family Empowerment Services staff had even more opportunities to attend a wide variety of trainings. Some of these trainings covered topics such as Child-Parent Psychotherapy, LGTBQIA+ Inclusivity, Trauma, and many more.

The <u>Family Empowerment Services</u> team prides themselves in providing an array of strength-based outpatient behavioral health services to Humboldt County children and youth, ages birth through twenty, through a trauma-informed resilience-oriented lens. Staff strive to meet the needs of families and youth through relational support in the home, school, community, and office settings.

Therapeutic Behavioral Services (TBS) are intensive, 1:1 short-term behavioral coaching and support services for children, youth and their parents/caregivers designed to manage specific identified behaviors. TBS services are provided in the home, school, and community with the parent and/or caregiver present.

Services (ICC) are intended to
ensure that all service providers
working with children/youth
with higher levels of need are in
alignment with one another,
the child or youth, and their
parent or primary caregiver.

373 hours of visitation provided to 16 families Supervised Visitation Services provided in collaboration with the Humboldt County Superior Court and funded through the Access to Visitation Grant Program with the goal of ensuring accessible supervised visitation services to low-income non-custodial parents with custody and visitation issues currently or previously before the family courts.

Continuing to Navigate the Pandemic...



This stage of the Pandemic placed a premium on flexibility during rapidly changing public health orders.

Mental Health staff had the ability to adjust appointments to meet the needs of each family and were able to start having more in-person appointments. The flexibility for virtual, outdoor, or in-office appointments allowed families and staff to feel safer and more comfortable.

With more time in the office together, staff were able to reconnect and collaborate as a team. It also gave families the opportunity to engage with staff in person, restoring connections that had been interrupted during the pandemic.

Staff also had the flexibility to work from home more, increasing their efficiency and allowing more time between appointments for staff to take care of themselves and strengthen their resiliency.

Child Care Services



Child Care Services staff members are committed to supporting families by reimbursing child care providers through a variety of subsidy programs. Staff also assist families in finding the right child care provider to fit their needs and offer support and supplies to the child care providers when they need it. For many families, affordable child care is necessary in order to seek and maintain employment, expand education, and many other reasons that are vital to a healthy community. It is also a great way for children to learn socialization skills and start their early education journey.







The Foster Bridge program provides emergency child care for families who may be asked to take in a child at a moment's notice and still be able to work. This program assists with finding a child care provider and supports paying for child care.

The providers in the Family Child Care Home Education Network

(FCCHEN) offer enhanced services for children 0-13 years old, including developmental assessments of children in care, education curriculum, and nutritious meals at no cost.

Foster Bridge supported 22 families and 28 children with child care

CalWORKS Stage 1 is a parent choice program which supports families to choose from a variety of child care options: center-based, licensed family child care, or family/friend/neighbor care. Funded by DHHS - Welfare to Work, this program assists families to become self-sufficient. Once stable, these families can transition to Stage 2 or 3.

Continuing to Navigate the Pandemic...



With the Pandemic continuing, keeping stipends available for child care providers was critically important. Additional stipends helped providers cover the increased operational costs that came with rising inflation. Meaning providers stayed open during a time when even more families went back to work.

Parent Services continued to support parents and guardians throughout the pandemic by hosting drive through in-person Pop Up Parent Cafés, virtual parenting classes, and virtual Parent Cafés.

Resource and Referral (R&R) Services play a vital role in the community, offering individualized support to parents, guardians, child care providers, and local organizations. During emergencies, including the recent pandemic, R&R staff are on the front lines, coordinating with local partners, supporting the resiliency of families and child care providers, and advocating for state and federal resources. From free referrals for child care and other services, to parenting classes, food and nutrition, supplies, hot meals, and technical assistance, our team is dedicated to meeting the needs of our community.

<u>Capacity Building &</u> <u>Professional Development</u>

provides child care business owners and other caregivers with trainings, technical assistance, and collaborative support groups to expand care opportunities, advance knowledge of child development, and improve the quality of care. Our goal is to help increase the availability and sustainability of early education in our area. Trainings include trauma informed care, preventive health & safety, gender diversity, fire safety, business practices, and more.

Child Care Food Program supports participating licensed child care providers in ensuring children have healthy meals and snacks. Providers are reimbursed per USDA guidelines. This past year, \$294,033.12 was reimbursed to providers to support healthy meals for the children in their care.

With in-person services still navigating around surges in the virus, the Nutrition Services team continued to be flexible in doing virtual demonstrations, providing resource bags with meal ingredients during Pop Up events, masking up for safe tabling events, and maintaining drop off visits.
